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4.3.Syllabus

The course will address the following topics:

Lectures (15h.).

1. Identity, ethnicity, culture and religion. Methodological considerations.
2. Kingship as a symbolic expresión of social identity: Egypt and Mesopotamia.
3. Ancient Israel: An exclusive identity within a national religious system.
4. Mazdayasna as an expresión of Iranian identity.
5. Locative religion and civic identity in the Greek *polis* and in the Roman *republica*.
6. Hellenistic-Roman religious pluralism: Compromise and problems in the context of multiple identities. Local systems and imperial globalization.
7. Image and reality of magic as religious alterity.
8. The construction of Christian identity: universal exclusivism and demonization of the ancient cults.

Practice sessions (15h.).

1. Iconography of kingship in the Ancient Near East: Egypt and Mesopotamia.
2. Persepolis and Nasq-i-Rustam.
3. Heroes' cult: Identity and difference. The Altar of Zeus in Pergamum.
4. *Ara Pacis* and *Forum Augustum*.
5. Texts and images of religious cosmopolitanism in the Roman Empire.
6. Magical papyri, gems and *tabellae defixionum*.
7. Libanius of Antiochia and John Chrisostome: two discourses on religious identity in the debate between "Pagans" and Christians.
8. Examples of symbolic appropriation in the transit from traditional religious systems to Christianity: from Aphrodisias to Sagalassos.
9. Presentations of monographic topics by the students.

Autonomous work (30h.).

Readings and scientific work of students to write their essays on the selected topics.
