Section II. Republican Rome

1. Polybius' mixed constitution (Plb. 6.11-18).
2. Democracy in Rome? The debate in the scholarship (Millar vs Hökeskamp).
3. The constitution of the Roman Republic. The formation of the Roman constitution. *Mos maiorum / Tradition* and the control of history by the aristocracy. Legitimation of State's violence.
4. The institutions of the Roman Republic:
 - magistrates
 - senate
 - popular assemblies
5. Oratory in the Roman Republic:
 - public speaking at Rome: A question of *auctoritas*
 - the political debate before the people, without the people
