4.1.Methodological overview

The methodology followed in this course is oriented towards the achievement of the learning objectives. It is based on participation, and the active role of the student favors the development of communication and decision-making skills. A wide range of teaching and learning tasks are implemented, such as lectures, assignments, workshop sessions, autonomous work, and tutorials.

Students are expected to participate actively in the class throughout the semester.

Classroom materials will be available via Moodle. These include a repository of the lecture notes used in class, the course syllabus, as well as other course-specific learning materials, including a discussion forum.

Further information regarding the course will be provided on the first day of class.

4.2.Learning tasks

The course includes 6 ECTS organized according to:

- Lectures. 1 hour/week. The professor will explain theoretical contents. Regular attendance is highly recommended.
- Workshops. 3 hours/week. The Workshop will be developed in two exercises of different focus: The first exercise consists of an urban analysis and diagnosis exercise. In the second exercise, students will design an urban

regeneration proposal.

- Visits. At the beginning of the course, on a date to be determined according to the academic calendar, students will visit the neighbourhood to carry out the workshops. In addition, there will be a voluntary trip to visit performances and urban references related to such guided assignments.
- Autonomous work
- Tutorials
- Complementary activities supervised by the teachers that will allow the students, who have passed the course, to improve their final grade.
